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CABBAGE STOCKS - JANUARY 1, 1952

Stocks from the 1951 Danish crop are the smallest in the 23 years of record, the Bureau of Agricultural Economics reported today. The 6,100 tons held by growers and dealers in or near producing areas on January 1, 1952 compares with 28,750 tons held on January 1, 1951 and the 1941-50 average of 46,200 tons. The previous low stocks of 6,300 were reported on January 1, 1948. Production of Danish cabbage was less than usual in 1947 and again in 1951. Prices were generally favorable during the harvesting season in both years. About 66 percent of the estimated stocks are in New York, 18 percent in Wisconsin, 11 percent in Michigan, 3 percent in Minnesota and 2 percent in Pennsylvania. Supplies in Ohio, Indiana and Colorado were virtually cleaned up by January 1.
