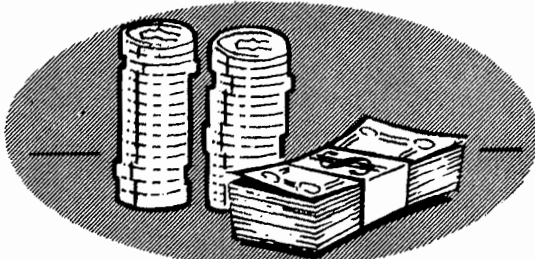


FARM INCOME SITUATION



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Direct Government payments to farmers as a percentage of cash receipts from farm marketings have trended upward in recent years. They are forecast at close to 8 percent this year, below the high 9-10 percent of 1939-40.

Government payments in 1967 totaled \$3.1 billion while marketing receipts were \$42.5 billion. Both payments and receipts are expected to be higher in 1968.

FARM INCOME SITUATION

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U.S. FARM INCOME IN 1967

Summary

Realized gross farm income at \$48.9 billion last year was the second highest on record, and some \$11 billion higher than in 1960. Realized net farm income, estimated at about \$14½ billion in 1967, was \$2.8 billion higher than in 1960, and, with the exception of 1966, higher than any year since 1951. Realized gross farm income for 1967 dropped below 1966 chiefly because record large supplies both at home and abroad weakened farm commodity prices.

On a per farm basis, realized gross farm income in 1967 was record high, almost \$15,500. It was 60 percent higher than in 1960. Realized net income per farm last year, at \$4,573, was down from the record level reached in 1966, but was some 55 percent higher than in 1960. The substantial improvement in average income per farm since 1960 has been due to both the increase in aggregate net farm income and the continued decline in farm numbers.

On a per capita basis, disposable personal income of the farm population from all sources, farm and nonfarm, was estimated at \$1,692 in 1967. This was down \$25 from the record level of a year earlier. There was a drop in the per capita personal income of farm people from

farm sources which was almost offset by another increase in their income from nonfarm sources. With a slight drop in the average disposable income of the farm population last year, while the average income of nonfarm people was rising, the ratio of farm peoples' income to that of nonfarm people dropped to 61 percent. This ratio was slightly below the 1965-66 level, but well above the 55 percent of 1960.

Farm Income Totals

Cash receipts from farm marketings in 1967 at \$42½ billion were estimated 2 percent lower than the total received in 1966. Farm prices last year were down about 5 percent from a year earlier while the volume of farm marketings was up about 3 percent. Receipts from livestock and livestock products totaled \$24.2 billion, down nearly 3 percent from 1966. Crop marketings brought in \$18.3 billion, almost the same as a year earlier.

Direct Government payments to farmers in 1967 were reported at close to \$3.1 billion compared with \$3.3 billion in 1966. The principal reason for last year's decline was a sharp drop in payments

under the Feed Grain Program, from \$1.3 billion in 1966 to around \$900 million in 1967. Soil Bank payments declined again last year for the fourth year in a row, and were about \$129 million in 1967 compared with a total of over \$800 million back in 1958 when the program was at its height.

The 1967 Cotton Program, which provided for a loan rate near world price levels with direct price support and diversion payments maintaining producers' incomes, resulted in a substantial increase in direct payments last year. They rose from \$773 million in 1966 to about \$932 million in 1967. Due to the increased unit value of wheat marketing certificates, payments to producers participating in the 1967 Wheat Program totaled \$731 million compared with \$679 million a year earlier.

Realized gross farm income (which includes marketing receipts, direct Government payments and imputed nonmoney income) was estimated at just under \$49 billion in 1967, down almost 2 percent from the record-high reached in 1966. Farm production expenses last year totaled an estimated \$34.4 billion, up about a billion dollars from a year earlier. Thus, with realized gross farm income falling slightly and farm production expenses continuing to rise, realized net farm income dropped from a near-record level of \$16.4 billion in 1966 to around \$14½ billion last year. This 1967 level of realized net farm income was about 25 percent higher than in 1960, and well above most other recent years with the exception of 1966.

In 1967, there was a small net increase in the value of the physical change in farm inventories of crops and livestock, compared with a slight net decrease in 1966. Total net farm income, which is the sum of realized net farm income and the net value of the inventory change, was \$14.9 billion in 1967, some \$1.3 billion less than a year earlier.

Income Per Farm

Realized gross income per farm in 1967 was a record high, \$15,415, compared with \$15,289 in 1966. Gross income per

farm in 1967 averaged almost \$6,000 per farm higher than in 1960. Realized net income per farm, however, declined almost \$500 from last year's record to a level of \$4,573. It was the second highest on record and more than \$1,600 per farm above the 1960 average. The number of farms (48 States) last year was estimated at close to 3.2 million, down 2½ percent from 1966, and about 20 percent less than the total number of farms in operation in 1960.

Preliminary State estimates of realized net income per farm in 1967 are shown in table 11, page 18. Changes from 1966 to 1967 are discussed starting on page 19. These State estimates are based on preliminary information including farm numbers by States available at the end of December. They will be revised in the Supplement to the July 1968 Farm Income Situation available in August 1968, utilizing SRS production, disposition, and income reports to be published this Spring and other more up-to-date public or trade data.

Disposable Personal Income Per Capita

The disposable personal income per capita of the farm population in 1967 was down about 1½ percent from the \$1,717 record high reached in 1966. This slight drop in 1967 resulted from a declining flow of farm income which more than offset an increase in per capita income from non-farm sources. There was a further decline in the farm population last year to around 11 million, down some 600 thousand from 1966. The farm population as a percentage of total population last year was around 5½ percent, compared with almost 9 percent in 1960.

Last year, the combined disposable income per capita of resident farm operators and others living on farms averaged close to 61 percent of that of nonfarm people, compared with 65 percent in 1966 and 55 percent in 1960. Thus, the average income of farm residents in 1967 was about 10 percent better relative to that of nonfarm residents than it was in 1960. However, the gap between the average income of farm and nonfarm people is still very wide and, even at best, farm people have received no

more than two-thirds the income of non-farm people.

Cash Receipts by Major Commodities

Preliminary estimates indicate that cash receipts from farm marketings of cattle and calves in 1967 totaled about \$10.4 billion, about the same as a year earlier. Prices for beef cattle averaged very close to 1966 levels. Information available at the end of 1967 pointed to little change overall in the volume of cattle and calves marketed compared with 1966. Hog prices last year averaged about 17 percent lower than in 1966 leading to a drop of some \$350 million in producers' receipts. The volume of hog slaughter increased more than 10 percent. In recent months, however, prices received by farmers for meat animals have rebounded from the 1967 low in November. In February 1968, prices received for beef cattle were \$1.20 per hundredweight above a year earlier. Hog prices last month were running close to February 1967 levels as marketings fell below the year-ago volume.

Receipts from farm marketings of dairy products were up about \$250 million last year due to a 5 percent increase in wholesale milk prices. There was a slight drop in the volume of milk sold to plants and dealers. Cash receipts from farm marketings of broilers were down about \$150 million as prices dropped substantially in the face of an increased volume of marketings and competition from large supplies of red meat. Egg prices to producers were down about one-fifth last year, as marketings were very abundant, resulting in decreased receipts of about \$300 million. A small drop occurred in receipts from farm marketings of turkeys, as prices averaged 14 percent lower last year in the face of a 12 percent increase in marketings.

Wheat marketing receipts, at \$2.1 billion, were higher last year than in 1966, as an increased volume of marketings from a record-large crop more than offset a decline in average prices received during the calendar year. Rice growers also received more than in 1966 reflecting a substantial increase in volume marketed. Re-

ceipts from farm marketings of corn totaled about \$2.6 billion, up about 3 percent from 1966 as the volume of marketings increased sharply. The 1967 corn crop was a record 4.7 billion bushels, nearly 15 percent larger than the previous high 4.1 billion bushel crop of 1966. Average prices for corn during the calendar year were down from a year earlier. Sorghum grain marketings were also up substantially last year due to a record crop; receipts were estimated about 8 percent higher than in 1966. In addition to the increase in receipts from farm marketings of food grains, producers participating in the 1967 Wheat Program also received an increase in certificate payments. On the other hand, corn and sorghum grain producers signed up in the Feed Grain Program last year received less in total payments than in 1966.

Receipts from cotton marketings were down sharply--about \$400 million--due mainly to the smallest cotton crop in many years. However, cotton farmers received income-supplementing payments under the 1967 Cotton Program which offset some of the drop in marketing receipts.

Cash receipts from farm marketings of tobacco were up about one-tenth, mainly due to an increased volume of marketings. Receipts from farm marketings of soybeans fell slightly last year despite a record crop, as prices for the new crop averaged about 25 cents per bushel less than for the 1966 crop.

Potato prices to growers were off slightly last year, leading to a drop in receipts of some \$50 million. On the other hand truck crop receipts were up about 4 percent, or close to \$75 million. Receipts from marketings of fruits and nuts, at \$1.7 billion, were about the same as a year earlier. A drop in receipts from citrus products was about offset by higher receipts for grapes, peaches, pears and pecans.

Production Expenses

Total production expenses in 1967, at \$34.4 billion, were about \$1 billion higher than in 1966. The rise from the

1966 level was less than one-half the unusually large increase in 1966 over 1965. An upward trend in expenses has persisted since 1945 with only three exceptions,--1949, 1953, and 1964.

The index of prices paid by farmers for production items, interest, taxes and wage rates rose 3 percent last year. Production items alone were up about $1\frac{1}{2}$ percent. Taxes payable were up 6 percent, farm wage rates rose 8 percent, and interest charges on farm real estate debt increased 12 percent. Most major production items were higher in price than a year earlier, with the principal exception being feeder livestock, which was down about 3 percent. Feed prices declined as the year progressed, but averaged slightly higher for the year as a whole. Farm machinery prices showed the largest percentage increase, up about 4 percent.

Farmers' expenses for items of farm origin--feed, livestock, and seed--totaled about \$10.5 billion last year, about the same as in 1966. An estimated drop in expenditures for purchased livestock was about offset by larger outlays for purchased feed and seed. Expenses for fertilizer showed another substantial increase, mainly because of increased usage. Farmers spent more for repairs and

operation of capital items as the cost of goods and services rose. Many miscellaneous items cost more last year. A notable exception was cotton ginning expenses which were down because of the sharply reduced size of the cotton crop.

Outlays for hired labor last year were around \$2.8 billion, about the same as in 1966. Wage rates were up about 8 percent, but this was offset by a continuation of the decline in the number of hired workers on farms.

Farm overhead costs continued their steep climb. The very high level of capital accumulation in recent years and higher prices for capital equipment resulted in a substantial increase in depreciation charges. Record high levels of interest paid on the farm mortgage debt and for taxes on farm property resulted from higher costs of borrowed capital and an increasing demand for more public services at the local level.

Short-term interest charges increased substantially last year to an estimated total of \$1.4 billion. Interest rates were higher and farmers borrowed more money for production purposes. Over the past 7 years, short-term interest charges have risen more than any other major expense account. The 1967 level was about double that of 1960.

PRELIMINARY STATE ESTIMATES FOR 1967

Cash Receipts

Cash receipts from farm marketings were down from 1966 in all but the South Atlantic Region. They decreased from a year earlier by 4 percent in the East North Central, 3 percent in the South Central, 2 percent in the North Atlantic and 1 percent in the West North Central and Western Regions. In the South Atlantic Region, cash receipts were up 1 percent.

Cash receipts from marketings for 25 of the 48 contiguous States in 1967 were less than in 1966; in 12 of these States, receipts were down 5 percent or more from a year ago. In 16 States, receipts were higher than a year ago, with 4 States showing increases of 5 percent or more (Kentucky, Louisiana, South Carolina, and Washington). In 7 States (Vermont, Pennsylvania, Michigan, South Dakota, Nebraska, North Carolina, and Florida) receipts remained about the same as a year earlier. The changes for the 48 States ranged from a 9 percent increase in Louisiana to a 13 percent decrease in Maine.

Ranked on the basis of total cash receipts from farm marketings in 1967, California was first with estimated receipts of \$3.9 billion and Iowa second with \$3.4 billion. Illinois ranked third (\$2.6 billion), Texas fourth (\$2.5 billion), Minnesota fifth (\$1.8 billion). The order of ranking in 1966 was the same for the first 5 States. Rounding out the first 10 States in 1967 were Nebraska, Kansas, Wisconsin, Missouri, and Indiana in that order. In 1967, the top 5 States accounted for about one-third of the total cash receipts from farm marketings for the 48 States.

Major changes in cash receipts by States from 1966 to 1967 are discussed in the following section.

Realized Net Income
Per Farm

State estimates for realized gross and net income per farm for 1965, 1966 and preliminary estimates for 1967 are presented in table 11. These data show that for

the 48 contiguous States, realized net income per farm declined from \$5,049 in 1966 to \$4,573 in 1967, down \$476. Thirty-eight States showed decreases from 1966 to 1967; 10 States all in the South and West showed increases. In 10 States the decrease was more than 15 percent.

Changes in realized net income for each State for 1967 compared with 1966 are stated with brief comments on receipts, Government payments, and expenses. Realized net income per farm for 1967 follows the name of the State. The figure in parenthesis is the percentage change in realized net income per farm from 1966 to 1967.

Alabama--\$2,534 (down 12%) -- Greatly reduced cotton lint and cottonseed cash receipts together with decreased broiler and egg receipts resulted in lower cash receipts from marketings in 1967 compared to a year earlier. Receipts from soybeans, dairy products and potatoes increased, with soybeans up sharply. Government payments were up from 1966. Production expenses were up slightly as depreciation and repair and operation expenses of farm capital items more than offset lower livestock purchases and other miscellaneous expenditures.

Arizona--\$23,650 (up 4%) -- Cash receipts from marketings increased slightly as a result of larger receipts from lettuce, oranges, barley and sorghum grain. Receipts were lower for cotton lint, cottonseed, grapefruit and sheep and lambs. Government payments in total were higher. Production expenses were higher. Expenditures for feed and hired labor increased. Outlays for livestock purchases were lower.

Arkansas--\$4,225 (down 22%) -- Cash receipts from marketings were down sharply. Smaller receipts from soybeans and broilers accounted for most of the decline, with cotton lint and cottonseed also lower. Wheat, tomatoes, turkeys and dairy product receipts increased from

a year ago, with wheat up sharply. Government payments were considerably higher. Production expenses were up due to increased outlays for hired labor and purchased feed plus depreciation charges which more than offset decreased livestock purchases.

California--\$11,857 (down 5%) -- Cash receipts from marketings were slightly below a year ago. Reduced receipts for cotton lint, eggs, cattle and calves, and oranges more than offset increases from tomatoes, hay, dairy products and lettuce. Government payments were up from a year earlier. Production expenses were slightly higher than a year ago. Taxes on farm property and feed expenditures increased. Hired labor costs and purchased livestock outlays were lower.

Colorado--\$3,817 (down 22%) -- Reduced cash receipts from wheat, lettuce, cattle and calves, and sheep and lambs resulted in lower cash receipts from marketings. Receipts were up for corn, dairy products and sorghum grains. Government payments were less than in 1966. Production expenses rose due mostly to increased hired labor and depreciation costs. Livestock purchases were lower.

Connecticut--\$8,078 (down 9%) -- Cash receipts from marketings dropped from a year earlier, primarily due to reduced egg receipts. Broiler and potato cash receipts were also down. Greenhouse and nursery cash receipts were up slightly. Production expenses also changed little as increased depreciation, feed, and other major expense items were largely offset by lower outlays for hired labor and livestock purchases.

Delaware--\$8,461 (up 12%) -- Cash receipts from marketings were up from a year earlier. Soybean receipts were well above 1966 and lima bean and snap bean receipts were also higher. Cash receipts from broilers, egg and corn marketings were down from a year ago. Government payments were lower. Production expenses were slightly higher as most expense outlays were up. Only livestock purchases and fertilizer and lime expenditures were down.

Florida--\$11,051 (down 2%) -- Little change occurred in cash receipts from marketings. Receipts decreased for oranges, eggs, potatoes and grapefruit but increased for sugarcane for sugar, dairy products, sweet corn and greenhouse and nursery products. Government payments were down. Production expenses were up due primarily to increased hired labor and feed expenditures. Fertilizer and lime expenses were down from a year ago.

Georgia--\$5,033 (down 2%) -- Larger cash receipts from peanuts and soybeans together with greatly increased receipts from tobacco caused a slight increase in total receipts from marketings. Receipts decreased for broilers, eggs, cotton lint and greenhouse and nursery products. Government payments decreased from a year earlier. Production expenses were higher as most expenditures were up. Livestock purchases were down from a year ago.

Idaho--\$4,886 (down 9%) -- Cash receipts from marketings in total were down slightly as receipts from potatoes declined sharply. Dry bean, hay, and sheep and lamb receipts were also lower than a year ago. Receipts were higher for wheat, sugarbeets, cattle and calves, and dairy products. Government payments declined slightly. Production expenses were up from a year earlier. The largest increases were for miscellaneous expense items and depreciation. Outlays for livestock purchases were lower.

Illinois--\$5,892 (down 21%) -- Lower cash receipts from marketings were led by sharp declines for corn, soybean and hog receipts. Receipts from wheat and cattle and calves increased from a year ago. Government payments were down. Production expenses were higher due to increases for depreciation, miscellaneous items and fertilizer and lime. Lower outlays were expended for purchased livestock.

Indiana--\$4,114 (down 21%) -- A substantial decrease in hog receipts together with additional declines in soybean and corn receipts resulted in lower cash receipts from marketings from a year earlier. Receipts from dairy products

and tobacco were up slightly. Government payments were below a year ago. Production expenses were higher. Increases for depreciation and miscellaneous items offset reduced expenditures for purchased feed.

Iowa--\$5,822 (down 21%) -- Cash receipts from marketings were down from a year ago. Substantial reductions in hog receipts and lower receipts from soybeans and eggs more than offset increases for corn, cattle and calves and dairy products. Government payments were down sharply from a year earlier. Production expenses were up due largely to increases for fertilizer and lime and miscellaneous items and depreciation. Outlays for purchased livestock were down from a year earlier.

Kansas--\$5,259 (down 13%) -- Lower cash receipts from marketings were caused by decreased receipts from wheat, soybeans, eggs and corn. Sorghum grain, dairy product and hay receipts were up from a year ago. Government payments were lower. Production expenses were higher as increased charges for depreciation more than offset lower expenditures for purchased livestock.

Kentucky--\$2,730 (up 10%) -- Cash receipts from marketings were higher due mostly to a substantial gain in receipts from tobacco. Soybean, corn, dairy products and wheat receipts also increased. Receipts from hogs, eggs and cattle and calves declined from a year earlier. Government payments were also lower. Production expenses were up due to increases for depreciation and taxes on farm properties. Outlays for livestock purchases were lower.

Louisiana--\$5,452 (up 17%) -- Cash receipts from marketings were higher due to sharp increases in soybean and cotton lint receipts together with increases from sugarcane for sugar and rice. Receipts from pecans, cattle and calves, cottonseed and eggs were lower. Government payments were higher than in 1966. Production expenses rose from a year earlier. Depreciation and other miscellaneous expenditures increased. Purchased live-

stock outlays were down.

Maine--\$3,705 (down 38%) -- Cash receipts from marketings declined sharply due largely to reduced potato receipts. Cash receipts from eggs and broilers were also lower. Receipts from sugar beets were up from a year earlier. Larger Government payments were received by farmers. Production expenses were up from a year earlier due to increased expenditures for hired labor and feed. Seed expenses were less than a year earlier.

Maryland--\$4,533 (up 1%) -- Cash receipts from marketings were down slightly as reduced receipts from broilers and a substantial reduction in tobacco receipts more than offset increases from corn, dairy products and soybeans. Government payments were down. Production expenses were just above 1966 due to increases for depreciation and other miscellaneous expenses which more than offset lower purchased feed and fertilizer and lime expenditures.

Massachusetts--\$4,835 (down 13%) -- Cash receipts from marketings were lower due to sharply reduced receipts from cranberries and eggs. Receipts from dairy products and potatoes were also down. Cash receipts from greenhouse and nursery products were slightly higher. Production expenses decreased primarily because of lower labor expenditures. Depreciation expenses were up.

Michigan--\$3,396 (down 9%) -- Cash receipts from marketings were down slightly due to reduced receipts from eggs, dry beans, corn and hogs. Higher receipts occurred for dairy products, peaches, sugar beets and apples. Lower Government payments were received by farmers. Production expenses were up as most major expense items were higher. Outlays for purchased livestock declined.

Minnesota--\$4,163 (down 11%) -- Government payments declined sharply from a year earlier and more than offset a small gain made in cash receipts from marketings. Cash receipts from corn, dairy products and wheat increased substantially. Receipts from hogs, soybeans

and eggs decreased from a year ago. Production expenses were higher. Miscellaneous expense items, depreciation, and fertilizer and lime expenditures increased most.

Mississippi--\$4,498 (up 8%) -- Total receipts from marketings were higher due to increased receipts from soybeans, wheat, rice and dairy products. Receipts were down from cottonseed, broilers, cotton lint, and cattle and calves. Government payments were up substantially from a year ago. Production expenses rose due to increases for depreciation and purchased feed. Outlays for hired labor and purchased livestock were lower.

Missouri--\$3,273 (down 14%) -- Reduced cash receipts from soybeans, and eggs plus a substantial reduction in cotton lint caused cash receipts from marketings to decline from a year earlier. Receipts were up for wheat and hogs. Lower Government payments were also received by farmers. Production expenditures increased. Depreciation and hired labor expenses were up and purchased livestock outlays declined.

Montana--\$6,631 (down 5%) -- Government payments and cash receipts from marketings were above a year earlier. Increased receipts from wheat more than offset declines from barley, sheep and lambs, and wool. Production expenses were up as most major expense items increased.

Nebraska--\$6,048 (down 10%) -- Higher cash receipts from corn more than offset reduced receipts from hogs, wheat, and eggs leaving a slight increase in cash receipts from marketings. Government payments were substantially reduced from the 1966 total. Production expenses rose from a year earlier due to increases for depreciation and miscellaneous expense items. Purchased livestock outlays were lower.

Nevada--\$7,163 (down 4%) -- Government payments were up from a year earlier. Slight upward increases in cash receipts from alfalfa seed, hay and cattle and calves caused a small increase in cash receipts. Production expenditures were up with most major expense items showing some increase from a year earlier.

New Hampshire--\$1,309 (down 42%) -- Cash receipts from marketings were down from a year earlier due mostly to lower egg receipts. Receipts from dairy products and apples were also down. Government payments were up slightly. Production expenses were a little higher. Larger expenditures for hired labor slightly offset lower outlays for miscellaneous expense items.

New Jersey--\$7,307 (down 17%) -- Government payments were lower and cash receipts from marketings were also down due to reduced receipts for eggs, greenhouse and nursery items and dairy products. Receipts from tomatoes and snap beans were up. Production expenses were slightly lower than a year earlier with reduced hired labor expenditures more than offsetting increased depreciation charges.

New Mexico--\$8,143 (down 6%) -- Cash receipts from marketings were down slightly from a year ago due to lower receipts for cotton lint, apples, wheat and cattle and calves. Receipts were considerably higher for lettuce and also increased for hay and sorghum grain. Government payments were down. Production expenses increased from a year earlier. Depreciation and hired labor expenses were up and purchased livestock expenditures were down.

New York--\$5,376 (down 3%) -- Cash receipts from marketings were a little higher because of increased receipts from dairy products and cherries. Receipts were down sharply for eggs and potatoes. Government payments were also down from a year earlier. Production expenses were higher with the largest increases for purchased feed and depreciation.

North Carolina--\$3,636 (down 1%) -- Increased cash receipts from tobacco, soybeans, corn and dairy products were largely responsible for the slight gain in cash receipts from marketings in spite of reduced receipts from broilers, eggs, cotton lint and peanuts. Government payments were a little lower than a year earlier. Production expenses were up as charges for depreciation more than off-

set lower hired labor outlays.

North Dakota--\$5,933 (down 10%) -- Government payments were lower than a year earlier. Cash receipts from marketings were only slightly lower as reduced receipts from flaxseed, barley, oats and rye slightly offset increased wheat receipts. Production expenses rose as most major expense items increased. Outlays for hired labor and purchased livestock declined.

Ohio--\$3,570 (down 16%) -- Cash receipts from marketings were down due mostly to reduced receipts from hogs and soybeans. Receipts also declined for eggs and wheat. Cash receipts increased for dairy products, tomatoes, corn and greenhouse and nursery products. Reduced Government payments were received by farmers. Production expenses were somewhat higher. Expenses increased most for depreciation, repairs and operation of farm capital items, and miscellaneous expense items. Outlays for purchased livestock declined.

Oklahoma--\$3,486 (down 13%) -- Decreased marketings of wheat together with cotton lint, barley and cottonseed were responsible for lower cash receipts from marketings. Receipts from pecans were considerably above a year ago with hay, dairy products, and soybean receipts also higher. Government payments were higher. Production expenses increased as most major expense items were up.

Oregon--\$4,160 (up 4%) -- Cash receipts from marketings were higher due to increased receipts from wheat, pears, potatoes and mint. Receipts were lower for barley, strawberries, and eggs. Government payments received by farmers were lower. Production expenses increased from a year earlier. Expenses for fertilizer and lime, depreciation and purchased feed were up. Hired labor outlays were down.

Pennsylvania--\$3,874 (down 6%) -- Government payments were a little lower but offset a slight gain in cash receipts from marketings. Receipts from dairy products and greenhouse and nursery products were higher while receipts from eggs,

tobacco, broilers and cherries were lower. Production expenses rose from year-earlier levels as most major expense categories showed an increase. Purchased livestock and seed expenditures were a little lower.

Rhode Island--\$2,136 (down 44%) -- Decreased receipts from potatoes, dairy products and eggs reduced cash receipts from marketings. Receipts from greenhouse and nursery items were up slightly. Production expenses were a little higher.

South Carolina--\$3,655 (up 11%) -- Cash receipts from marketings were higher due to increased tobacco receipts which were well above a year earlier. Cash receipts from cotton lint, cottonseed, peaches and dairy products were lower than a year ago. Government payments were up. Production expenses were above a year earlier. Depreciation and purchased feed outlays were up substantially.

South Dakota--\$6,001 (down 8%) -- Government payments to farmers were down sharply. Cash receipts from marketings remained about the same as a year earlier. Increased receipts from wheat, oats and cattle and calves nearly offset decreases from hogs, eggs and corn. Production expenses rose from a year earlier as most expense items increased.

Tennessee--\$1,815 (down 5%) -- Cash receipts from marketings were down from a year ago. Cotton lint and cottonseed receipts were well below a year earlier and corn and broiler receipts also declined but receipts for soybean, wheat and dairy products were higher. Government payments were up. Production expenses were higher as increases for depreciation more than offset reduced hired labor expenditures.

Texas--\$5,010 (down 17%) -- Cash receipts from marketings were below a year ago due mostly to reduced receipts from cotton lint and cottonseed which were the lowest in many years. Receipts from wheat and cattle and calves were also lower. Receipts from sales of sorghum grain, rice, soybeans, and pecans were larger. Government payments were a little higher. Production expenses were up due to increases for depreciation and most other major ex-

pense items. Livestock purchases and hired labor outlays were below a year earlier.

Utah--\$2,923 (down 9%) -- Cash receipts from marketings increased slightly due to higher receipts from greenhouse and nursery products, dairy products and hay. Receipts declined for turkeys, eggs and sheep and lambs. Government payments were also lower than a year ago. Production expenses rose as most expense items increased with depreciation showing the largest gain.

Vermont--\$4,654 (down 1%) -- Cash receipts from marketings were up slightly from a year earlier. Receipts from dairy products and apples were higher but eggs and maple products were lower. Production expenses were up with the largest increase for purchased feed. Fertilizer and lime expenditures were somewhat lower.

Virginia--\$2,443 (up 3%) -- Increased cash receipts from marketings resulted primarily from larger receipts for dairy products, potatoes, apples and corn. Egg and hog receipts were down from a year earlier. Government payments remained unchanged from a year earlier. Production expenses were higher due mostly to increases for depreciation and repairs and operation of farm capital items. Hired labor outlays were down.

Washington--\$6,417 (up 10%) -- Cash receipts from marketings and Government payments were up. Receipts for wheat and pears were up sharply. Increases also occurred for cattle and calves and apples.

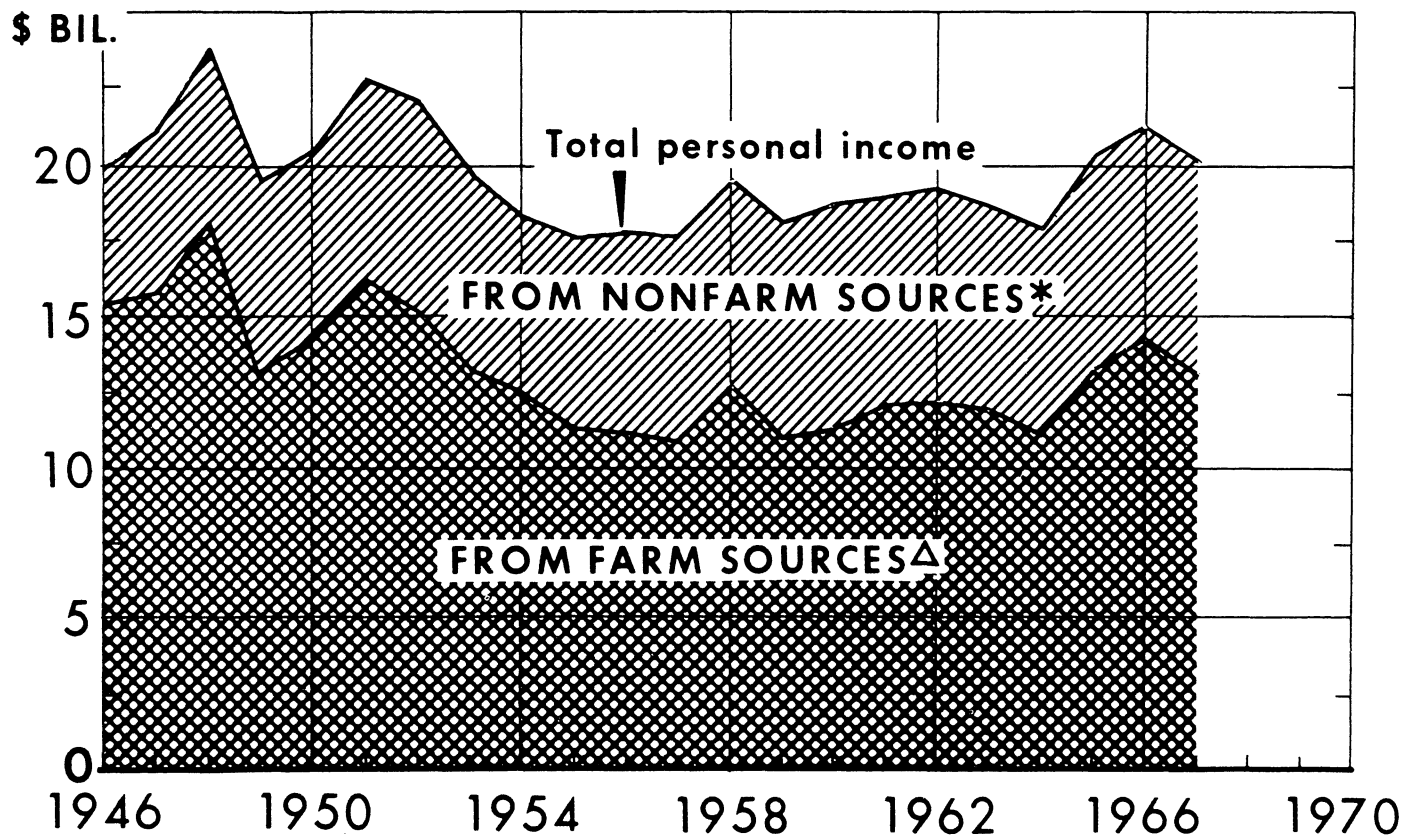
Receipts from barley, forest products, eggs and sugar beets were down. Production expenses were up as increases for purchased feed and depreciation more than offset reduced hired labor expenditures.

West Virginia--\$855 (down 12%) -- Cash receipts from marketings were down slightly. Lower broiler, egg and hog receipts offset increases for dairy products, hay, and apples. Production expenses were higher as depreciation and most other major expense items increased from a year earlier. Fertilizer and lime expenditures declined.

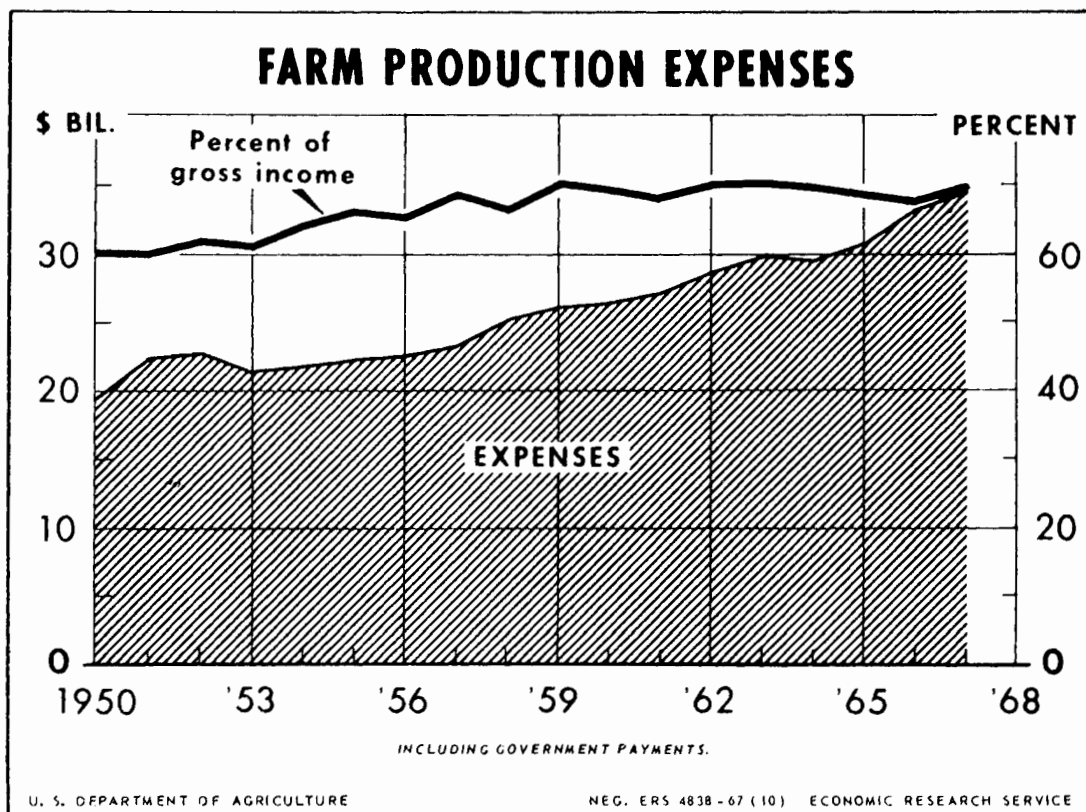
Wisconsin--\$4,664 (down 6%) -- Cash receipts from marketings were a little higher than a year earlier. Receipts from dairy products, green peas and corn were higher but were largely offset by declines in receipts from hogs and eggs. Government payments were down sharply from a year earlier. Production expenses rose due to increases for depreciation, feed and most other expense items.

Wyoming--\$6,034 (down 8%) -- Government payments were a little lower and cash receipts from marketings declined slightly from year earlier levels. Reduced receipts from wool, sheep and lambs, and cattle and calves more than offset increases from wheat, sugar beets and hay. Production expenses were somewhat higher as most major expense items increased. Outlays for purchased livestock declined.
