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## COLONY, HONEY PLANT AND MARKET CONDITIONS DURING JULY 2020

APPALACHIAN DISTRICT (MD, PA, VA, WV): The month of July was hot and humid interrupted by an occasional isolated shower or thunderstorm. Water levels were low and most properties needed rain. Daytime temperatures were consistently in the upper eighties to upper nineties with some days recording heat indexes over 100 degrees Fahrenheit. Many Beekeepers are reporting bearding behavior due to the heat. Nectar and pollen supplies are very light, which is normal for this time of year and with the drier weather. A few bees were still gathering from clovers, monarda, milkweed, mountain mint and various other wildflowers. Several were providing supplemental food. Overall health is reported as good, with an instance of American Foul brood appeared and quickly destroyed. Penn State and University of Maryland continued to offer free webinars on various bee topics with summer with reports of very good participation. Beekeepers are still not meeting physically due to various state restrictions on gathering during the pandemic, but a few have met in on-line forums. Inspectors from all states are following their recommended state guidelines during on-site inspections.

ALABAMA: Most beekeepers around the state wrapped up their last main honey extraction event of the year by mid-July. Despite a slow start to the honey season, yields were reported to be good. Beekeepers remained diligent over the moisture content of their honey, especially in southern regions due to the high humidity of continual daily weatherevents. As the summer dearth hit, brood rearing decreased and varroa mite levels increased. The Bee Informed Partnership's Sentinel Apiary program reported several colonies reaching the threshold of 3 mites per 100 bees. Small hive beetle levels were also described to be increasing by the state's inspectors. Physical distancing measures as a result of COVID-19 continued to restrict in-person group events.

ARIZONA: No report issued.

ARKANSAS: During the month of July temperatures were mostly normal across most of the state. Precipitation during July was below normal across most of the state. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, Arkansas had mostly normal soil moisture for May.

Commercial beekeepers are reporting that their bees are looking healthy. According to beekeepers, there have been only minimal colony losses this year. Varroa mites seem to be under control.

Few prices exist to establish a current market price for wholesale white honey. Beekeepers are reporting prices from \$1.25-\$1.30 per pound.

CALIFORNIA: Persistent drought and colony losses continued to plague California beekeepers through July into early August. "I recently spoke with two large commercial beekeepers from the Sacramento Valley," a beekeeper said. "We're all having a hard time. Bloom timings have been running late, and we are in drought. Colonies are not growing. In order to supply bees for almonds, we will need to put a lot of money into feed. But because of the glut of almonds, growers won't want to reimburse us for that investment."

Honey was so scarce that beekeepers were unable to cover regular customers. "This is the first time we have never extracted any honey since I began beekeeping in 1971," another beekeeper said.

Some beekeepers started feeding bees pollen substitutes and sugar syrup earlier than usual to keep the bees alive for almond pollination and to stimulate queens to keep laying eggs. For some, queen losses continued into early August. One beekeeper bought 300 queens in July alone. He still had to buy more, he said. Last year, he bought more than 1,600 in total. "Unfortunately, that seems to be the rule more than the exception in recent years." He said. Since 2004, his company had been losing bees more than ever before as health declines in colonies. Among other factors, he cited varroa mites, pesticides and poor nutrition due to drought. Most years, he's kept 10 to 15 percent of his hives in coastal areas, but because of this summer's drought, he kept them all in the Central Valley, where they've recently pollinated cantaloupes. Some bees have made honey from alfalfa and cotton. "I'm afraid that when that's done, it'll be done for the year," the beekeeper said. Last year, the bees worked blue curls and tarweed.

Despite the scarcity of honey, the market was still about the same as the same time last year, ranging from \$1.50 to \$1.80 per pound, he said.

FLORIDA: The temperatures were about normal with both high temperatures and high humidity resulting in heat indexes exceeding 110 degrees on many days. The rainy season had still not begun in many areas resulting in below normal precipitation for many places in Florida. Bee health was considered to be good with many beekeepers treating for mites and generally getting good results. Mangrove ended early in the month and gallberry and palmetto also ended during July. There was still some cabbage palm and a few scattered wildflowers, but supplemental feeding was widespread as beekeepers were trying to keep their bee numbers high in anticipation of Brazilian Pepper season beginning in early September. Florida bees were still in a number of northern states such as the Dakotas and New York producing clover honey or honey from goldenrod. Some of these bees are expected to return for the Pepper season with others remaining in the North until cooler weather begins in the fall. Any honey produced in the state was being used by the hives for their maintenance resulting in little to no honey being available for sale or in storage at the end of the month.

GEORGIA: July was a pretty hot month for most of the state. Plenty of rain but most areas were okay as the storms seemed to move pretty quickly and not stick around too long. Losses are reported to be average for the year with most reporting 30-40 percent loss of bees after bringing in the hives from the melon fields in the Central and Southern areas. Treatments for hive beetles and mites are ongoing to prevent damage later in the year and to protect the Fall flow for those that pull honey off the hives or leave it in for food for later use. Retail sales is doing well while the wholesale market is slow to catch up while waiting for more businesses to reopen during the pandemic.

IDAHO, COLORADO, UTAH: During the month of July, temperatures in Idaho were normal to mostly below normal. Utah and Colorado experienced above average temperatures for the month. Idaho and Utah experienced slightly below normal precipitation during the month. Colorado experienced below average precipitation during the month. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, Idaho had normal soil moisture with only a small part of Central Idaho having severe drought conditions in July. Utah had moderate to severe drought conditions across most of the state. Colorado had moderate to areas of extreme soil drought conditions across most of the state during the month of July.

Most beekeepers, in Idaho, had to provide some supplemental feed for their bees in July due to the dry conditions. Utah and Colorado beekeepers had to provide supplemental feed for their bees due to the dry conditions. The divided colonies were affected more by the lack of honey stores than the established colonies. During July good nectar was available from Dutch clover, Sweet Clover, alsike clover, alfalfa and many other types of wildflowers.

Beekeepers are reporting that their bees are looking very healthy with few losses.

Demand for Idaho, Utah and Colorado honey continues to be very good for locally sourced honey. Some recent sales of white honey ranged from \$1.25 to \$1.40 per pound, mostly \$1.25-\$1.30. Where the price goes, depends upon how much domestic honey is produced according to beekeepers.

**ILLINOIS:** Temperatures for the month of July were slightly higher than average with several days of 90F weather. There was average rainfall but it was intermittent with long dry spells in between rainy days. Beekeepers report that their bees continue to feed on Dutch Clover, basswood, and some white sweet clover. Asian beetles were a problem in some areas. Varroa mites continue to be a problem and beekeepers are treating for them. The bees are said to be in good condition. Beekeepers report an excellent amount of honey flow. Demand for honey is good at the retail level and fairly good at the wholesale level. Prices are generally unchanged.

**INDIANA:** The weather for July was higher than usual with very few days of rain. Beekeepers report that most of their bees are in fair condition. Beekeepers also report that there are very little wildflowers left for the bees. Beekeepers report fair to good production in the month of July. Demand for honey is fairly good at the retail level and good at wholesale level. Prices are generally unchanged.

**IOWA, KANSAS, MISSOURI, NEBRASKA:** No report issued.

**KENTUCKY:** No report issued.

**LOUISIANA:** During the month of July temperatures were normal to slightly above normal across most of the state. Precipitation during June was above normal across most of the state. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, Louisiana had mostly normal soil moisture for July.

Commercial beekeepers are reporting that their bees are looking healthy. According to beekeepers, there have been only minimal colony losses this year. Varroa mites seem to be under control.

Few prices exist to establish a current market price for wholesale white honey. Beekeepers are reporting prices from \$1.25-\$1.30 per pound.

**MICHIGAN:** the month brought warm and dry conditions; just enough rainfall to keep things growing and nectar flowing. The main forage sources included White sweet clover, Red and Dutch clovers, alfalfa as well as several herbs, such as peppermint, horsemint, beebalm, lavender, oregano and hyssop. Other blooming plants such as Joe Pye weed, Bull Thistle, Russian Sage, and Spotted Knapweed also provided nectar sources throughout the month. Honey production has been good; beekeepers were busy with honey extraction, supering, and monitoring and treating for varroa mites. The demand for local honey remained fairly strong this month at local markets, with prices stable.

**MINNESOTA:** During the month of July temperatures were above normal across most of Minnesota. Precipitation was slightly below normal to normal the state. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, a small area of moderate drought was present in the Northeastern areas of the state during the month. The rest of the State of Minnesota had normal soil moisture conditions during the same period.

There is hope that with good fly time, bees will be able to make a good volume of honey. During July good nectar was available from Basswood Trees, Dutch clover, Sweet Clover, alsike clover and many other types of wildflowers. Not many bee losses have been noticed this summer by beekeepers. Beekeepers treated for mites right up to the time when honey was going to be produced. So far, mite checks seem to indicate that the varroa mite numbers are low. Overall bees seem to be looking very good. Queens are actively laying brood and in good condition.

This year Honey Producers have run into a problem that many companies have had to deal with, how to have meetings without actually getting together due to the Corona virus. Technology, such as Zoom, makes it possible to have everyone together via computer. Probably not the perfect solution but at least better than nothing at all.

Demand for Minnesota honey continues to be very good for locally sourced honey. Early quality appears to be good. Prices for 2020 new crop have not been established at this time. Prices being quoted range from \$1.25-\$1.40 per pound, mostly \$1.25-\$1.30. Where the price goes, depends upon how much domestic honey is produced according to beekeepers.

**MISSISSIPPI:** Honey has been pulled and reported to be excellent quality, good color and taste with low moisture content. The bees are reported to be in good shape and heavy bodied before the Fall season comes in later. The Spring crop is considered short as compared to previous years. Beekeepers are busy treating the hives for mites and preparing the bees for the rest of the year.

**MONTANA:** No report issued.

**NEW ENGLAND:** New England weather in July, for the most part had average temperatures combined with high humidity at the end of the month. Precipitation and soil moisture levels are well above average and holding steady with ample pollen sources and many nectar sources are now starting to slow and end quickly. New England has experienced hot daytime temperatures in the high 80s and mid-90s with high humidity levels.

Reportedly, this season started off with a record number of swarms experienced by many veteran beekeepers especially around Mothers' Day. During the latter part of this month of July, bees are putting what they are bringing inside the hive into brood production. Many hives have bees clustered on the front of the hive with many hives bearding. This indicates that the bees are not out foraging and are opportunistic to any easy nectar source.

Stronger hives made some nice light Tatarian and Bell's honeysuckle, locust, blackberry, clover, and a bit of staghorn sumac honey recently. This seasons main foraging sources started with working black locust, swamp thistle, button bush, purple looserstrife, wild radish, American basswood/linden, milkweed, alfalfa, winded sumac, staghorn sumac, smooth sumac, buckwheat, sweet pepper bush, meadow sweet (produces a light olive pollen color) as well as vegetable crops and a variety of flowering trees and wild flowers. Some excellent pollen and nectar sources for bees are the legumes such as alsike clover, purple vetch, birds foot trefoil, alfalfa, and clovers such as white sweet clover, and yellow sweet clover and native Joe-Pye-weed as well as the ornamental tree Korean Evodia and corn; are all in full bloom at this point in time and the bees are loving it. Many New England keepers are hoping for massive bamboo (*Fallopia japonica*) flow in late August/early September to fill the supers again.

Honey flows have been good in strong colonies with keepers reportedly extracting 2 times before starting their mite treatments. Early commercial crop pollination services involved cranberries with pollination fees ranging from \$125.00 to \$150.00 mostly \$130.00 per hive with 4- hives per pallet and a 1- pallet minimum depending on transportation cost requirements.

Early harvested honey reportedly was some of the highest quality and lightly colored ever. Harvested honey has been averaging 35 lbs. per colony. Beekeepers have been busy concentrating on extracting honey. The Italian and Russian honeybees have reportedly been the best honey producers with

keepers that have been successful with strong honey production numbers. For the most part, colonies were reported to be in good condition with few disease or mite problems. Varroa mites are typically a problem in July and August.

Demand at all retail/wholesale outlets remains good and honey market prices are steady. Prices quoted for retail 1 lb. bottled units were \$9.00 to \$14.00 mostly \$12.00, occasionally higher, and 1 Quart bottled units were \$18.00 to \$24.00 mostly \$22.00, occasionally higher, inclusive of all varieties; Additionally, current prices quoted for 1 Quart bottled units for raw pollen were \$28.00 to \$32.00 mostly \$30.00 and for raw Propolis tincture are \$16.00 to \$20.00 mostly \$18.00 for 2-ounce containers.

NEW YORK: July temperatures were unusually warm with dry conditions much of the month. Plant have little moisture to put forth nectar and have been physiologically stressed with an abnormal phenology that has disrupted flowering and flows. The hot and dry weather has impacted the water content of the honey harvested. The harvested honey is abnormally dry, and the amounts are below average. The floral composition has also been altered; sumac, basswood and other sources did not produce as much as in previous years with odd floral sources adding to an unusually flavored wildflower honey. The early summer honey is rather darker than the light amber that we would normally extract.

The dry weather will continue to impact the bee colonies in the near future, as well as the goldenrod flow in early September unless we receive some ample rainfall. If the current weather pattern continues, beekeepers may need to do additional supplemental feeds prior to the end of August, as colony stress will amplify. Honey sales have suffered by the pandemic with closings and partial closings of many markets. Many restaurants, cafes and retail stores have stopped buying local honey. Prices at the retail level have stalled and wholesale prices also remain quite low. Some local beekeepers what recognize lower harvests may be in search of local honey sources in the near future. Some reports of American Foulbrood and failing hives are being noted.

NORTH CAROLINA: Temperatures in North Carolina were above normal for July with a statewide average temperature of 79.7°F. Precipitation was below normal, even as the southern coast experienced showers from Tropical Storm Fay early in the month. Overall statewide soil moisture levels were rated 9.5 percent very short, 34.5 percent short, 52.5 percent adequate, and 3.5 percent surplus the week ending August 01. For the first time since early February, the North Carolina Drought Management Advisory Council reported 12 counties as being abnormally dry.

Colonies were in fairly good condition, however, pest pressures from varroa mites and hive beetles continued to rise, according to apiary inspectors. Reports of brood diseases were low except for some colonies experiencing varroa-delivered viral infections. Some swarming and supersedure swarms were reported in the southern Coastal Plains region, while swarming was rare in the southern Piedmont region. Bees were reportedly more defensive throughout the month of July as temperatures soared and nectar availability declined; many beekeepers had to begin providing supplemental feed to their bees. When available, bees could be seen working Basswood, Linden, and Sourwood in the Mountain region. Various clovers (Ladino, White, and Sweet) were available throughout the Mountain and Piedmont regions. Also, available in the Piedmont region was Alsike Clover and Heartsease, Smartweed. Sumac was available across the State.

Commercial pollinator hives in North Carolina spent the month working cucurbits, including cucumbers, pumpkins, squash, and watermelon. Replacement beekeepers began preparing colonies for next spring's sales by making splits and raising or buying queens. Current supply and demand for bees is seasonally light.

Supply of honey is moderate. Demand is also moderate; however, sales have been negatively impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic as local beekeepers have experienced reduced marketing opportunities with the cancellation of fairs, festivals, and stores having to reduce customer capacity in light of social distancing regulations. Retail prices at the Raleigh State Farmers' Market were unchanged: \$7.00-\$8.00 per 8-ounce jar, \$12.00-\$13.00 per 16-ounce jar, \$22.00 per 32-ounce jar, and \$18.00 per 44-ounce jar. Prices at the Piedmont Triad Farmers' Market in Greensboro were also unchanged at: \$8.00-\$12.00 per 8-ounce jar, \$12.00-\$18.00 per 22-ounce jar, and \$20.00 per 32-ounce jar.

NORTH & SOUTH DAKOTA: Weather was generally good. Crop plantings and emergence continued near or slightly behind last year. Improving weather and field conditions helped to bring many crops along. Alfalfa first cuttings were well ahead of last year early in the month with second cuttings coming along during the rest of July, ahead of last year and slightly behind average. Sunflower bloom was at 21% in late July, ahead of last year and behind the average. According to a NASS report on honeybee colonies, in the second quarter of 2020 (April-June) North and South Dakota started with approximately 76,500 colonies increasing to a maximum of 600,000. During the period 22,100 colonies were lost, 37,500 added and 51,500 renovated.

OHIO: Cool and wet weather conditions were quickly replaced with extremely hot and humid days and spotty downpours. Some areas of the state have had little to no rain with tightly rolled soybean and corn leaves while other regions have had enough for soybeans to produce ample secretion and happy bees. A record was set in Columbus with 19 days of temperatures in July of 90 degrees or above. Previously, the capitol had not seen 8 days of 90 degree plus days in twenty years. Cincinnati and Defiance suffered with 15 days of 90 degree plus days, while the greater Cleveland area had 5 days of high temperatures. These warmer temperatures sped the growing degree days and flowering with the first bloom of the panicked goldenraintree in early July in the Cincinnati area. This species is just now blooming in the suburbs of Cleveland. The first bloom in the north was the bottlebrush buckeye and Littleleaf Linden. Basswood and Black Locust was disappointing to beekeepers in many areas around the state, with little to no bloom due to cold temperatures, or too cool for bees to visit them. When rainfall occurred, honeybees have packed brood chambers with nectar, leaving little room for queens to lay eggs. Beekeepers have added supers to keep the brood areas free of honey to keep the queens laying to maintain high populations of bees in the colonies. Swarming continues in areas with abundant forage, along with generous honey production: one of the best flows in years! Beekeepers will need to remain vigilant as varroa mite populations are climbing and some colonies are losing queens. Overall, hives have remained healthy, despite insect pressure. In Northwest Ohio, very warm and dry conditions prevailed. Forage sources included white sweet clover, soybeans, wild carrot, monarda, swamp milkweed and Joe Pye weed currently in bloom. The Basswood flow was disappointing as blossoms froze in early May. At month's end, temperatures have subsided to normal levels, which should help fall flowers produce nectar later. Honey prices remain stable at \$5-6 per pound wholesale and \$8-10 retail.

OKLAHOMA: During the month of July temperatures were below normal to normal across the Central and Western part of the state. Temperatures in Eastern Oklahoma were normal to above normal. Precipitation during July was normal to above normal across most of the state. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, Eastern Oklahoma had normal soil moisture progressing to extreme drought conditions as you move West.

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Few prices exist to establish a current market price for wholesale white honey. Beekeepers are reporting prices from \$1.25-\$1.30 per pound.

OREGON: No report issued.

SOUTH CAROLINA: No report issued.

TENNESSEE: No report issued.

TEXAS: During the month of July temperatures were above normal across most of the state. Precipitation during June was slightly below normal to normal across most of the state. The exception being Northeast Texas where precipitation was slightly above normal. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor website, the Panhandle and most of West Texas had abnormally dry to a few spots of extreme drought conditions for the month. The remainder of the state shows normal to moderate drought conditions.

July was pretty much what you expect in Texas, hot and dry. When temperatures go into the triple digits in mid-May most Texans are expecting a hot summer. Mother nature did not let them down. The first hurricane of the season hits the coast just below Corpus Christi and most of the state saw very little to no rainfall from it as it turned South into Mexico. By the end of the month most of the wildflower bloom had dried up.

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WASHINGTON: Warm and dry as harvest picked up, with increasing temperatures later in the month. Berry harvest moved along with a jump in blueberries. Apricot harvest was short due to spring cold weather. Peaches, nectarines, apples, and pears continued to develop. Cherry harvest moved into some later districts. Alfalfa was in second cutting. Bees continued to work some higher elevation floral sources. According to a NASS report on honeybee colonies, in the second quarter of 2020 (April-June) Washington started with approximately 50,000 colonies increasing to a maximum of 114,000 during peak tree fruit bloom. During the period 3,100 colonies were lost, 5,000 added and 3,300 renovated.

WISCONSIN: Slightly more overcast than previous year. Heat wave in early July. There were weeklong periods of 80F weather. There was slightly more rain for this time of year separated by very high temperatures and dry periods. Beekeepers report treating for varroa mites with oxalic acid. There has been no problem with insects. Generally, bees are in good condition. The bees are foraging on Queen Anne's lace, chicory, lilies, cup plant, cone flowers, fennel, coriander, dill, fleabane, mints, creeping Charlie, anise hyssop, Joe Pye weed, boneset, white clover and fall raspberries. Production was good. Demand for honey is good at the retail level and fairly good at the wholesale level. Prices are generally unchanged.
