REPORT OF COLD STORAGE APPLE HOLDINGS, NOVEMBER 1, 1917.

Reports from 486 storages show that their rooms contain 2,404,207 barrels and 2,388,483 boxes of apples. The 453 storages that reported for November 1 of this year and last show a present stock of 2,344,861 barrels and 2,322,954 boxes, as compared with 2,529,821 barrels and 2,189,753 boxes last year, a decrease of the equivalent of 140,560 barrels or 4.3 per cent. For the purposes of this comparison, it is considered that three boxes are equivalent to one barrel. The reports of 390 storages show that 68.6 per cent of the December 1, 1916, holdings of apples have already been placed in cold storage. Last year on November 1, the reports of 292 storages showed that 72.8 per cent of the December 1, 1916, holdings had been placed in storage. A summary of this report was released by wire on November 13. As a few storages have not responded to our inquiries, this report does not include all holdings. REPORT OF COLD STORAGE HOLDINGS OF CREAMERY BUTTER, NOVEMBER 1, 1917

Reports from 396 cold storages show that their rooms contain 100,114,760 pounds of CREAMERY BUTTER while on October 1, 403 storages reported 106,475,760 pounds. The 345 storages that reported holdings on November 1, of this year and last show a present stock of 93,209,717 pounds as compared with 85,260,302 pounds last year, an increase of 7,949,415 pounds or 9.3 per cent. The reports show that during October, the October 1 holdings decreased 6.0 per cent, while our last report showed that during September the September 1 holdings increased 0.1 per cent. Last year the decrease during October was 15.7 per cent and in September the decrease was 7.8 per cent. A summary of this report was released by wire on November 13. As a number of firms have not responded to our inquiries, this report does not include all holdings. REPORT OF COLD STORAGE HOLDINGS OF AMERICAN CHEESE, NOVEMBER 1, 1917.

Reports from 451 cold storages show that their rooms contain 85,239,181 pounds of AMERICAN CHEESE while on October 1, 462 storages reported 92,449,996 pounds. The 402 storages that reported holdings on November 1 of this year and last show a present stock of 76,128,874 pounds as compared with 45,712,972 pounds last year, an increase of 30,415,902 pounds or 66.5 per cent. The reports show that during October, the October 1 holdings decreased 6.5 per cent, while our last report showed that during September, the September 1 holdings increased 0.4 per cent. Last year the decrease during October was 7.6 per cent and the decrease during September was 5.3 per cent. A summary of this report was released by wire on November 13. As a few storages have not responded to our inquiries, this report does not include all holdings. Upon request, any or all of the information contained in the cold storage reports will be telegraphed immediately upon its release. REPORT OF COLD STORAGE HOLDINGS OF EGGS, NOVEMBER 1, 1917.

Reports from 446 cold storages show that their rooms contain 4,457,699 cases of eggs while on October 1, 461 storages reported 5,624,684 cases. The 408 storages that reported holdings on November 1, of this year and last show a present stock of 4,407,881 cases as compared with 3,650,270 cases last year, an increase of 757,611 cases or 20.8 per cent. The reports show that during October, the October 1 holdings decreased 19.8 per cent while our last report showed that during September, the September 1 holdings decreased 6.4 per cent. Last year the decrease during October was 25.3 per cent, and during September the decrease was 15.3 per cent. A summary of this report was released by wire on November 13. As a few storages have not responded to our inquiries, this report does not include all holdings. Upon request any or all of the information contained in the cold storage reports will be telegraphed immediately upon its release. REPORT OF STOCKS OF FROZEN POULTRY, NOVEMBER 1, 1917.

TOTAL POULTRY

The total stocks of FROZEN POULTRY reported by 275 storages on November 1, 1917, amounted to 46,206,059 pounds; while the total stocks reported on October 1, 1917, amounted to 45,145,433 pounds. The reports of 195 storages show stocks of 33,230,339 pounds on November 1, 1917, as compared with 31,174,509 pounds on November 1, 1916, an increase of 6.7 per cent. The reports show that the stocks decreased 0.9 per cent during October, 1917, while they increased 57.3 per cent during October, 1916.

BROILERS.

The total stock of BROILERS reported by 149 storages on November 1, 1917, amounted to 3,819,587 pounds, while the total stocks reported by 142 storages on October 1, 1917, amounted to 3,405,894 pounds. The reports of 101 storages show stocks of 1,598,598 pounds on November 1, 1917, as compared with 2,358,617 pounds on November 1, 1916, a decrease of 32.2 per cent. The reports of 120 storages show that the stocks increased 7.7 per cent during October, 1917, while the reports of 81 storages show stocks increased 57.7 per cent during October, 1916.

ROASTERS.

The total stocks of ROASTERS reported by 139 storages on November 1, 1917, amounted to 3,723,300 pounds, while the total stocks reported by 133 storages on October 1, 1917, amounted to 3,275,639 pounds. The reports of 94 storages show stocks of 2,470,762 pounds on November 1, 1917, as compared with 2,039,648 pounds on November 1, 1916, an increase of 21.1 per cent. The reports of 111 storages show that the stocks increased 7.6 per cent during October, 1917, while the reports of 71 storages show stocks increased 105.7 per cent during October, 1916.

FOWLS.

The total stocks of FOWLS reported by 157 storages on November 1, 1917, amounted to 2,555,952 pounds, while the total stocks reported by 148 storages on October 1, 1917, amounted to 2,000,992 pounds. The reports of 111 storages show stocks of 1,502,431 pounds on November 1, 1917, as compared with 1,881,079 pounds on November 1, 1916, a decrease of 20.1 per cent. The reports of 125 storages show that the stocks increased 10.4 per cent during October, 1917, while the reports of 89 storages show stocks increased 25.8 per cent during October, 1916.

TURKEYS.

The total stocks of TURKEYS reported by 145 storages on November 1, 1917, amounted to 3,538,393 pounds, while the total stocks reported by 140 storages on October 1, 1917, amounted to 3,404,513 pounds. The reports of 91 storages show stocks of 1,372,199 pounds on November 1, 1917, as compared with 401,283 pounds on November 1, 1916, an increase of 242.0 per cent. The reports of 121 storages show that the stocks decreased 9.9 per cent during October, 1917, while the reports of 72 storages show that the stocks increased 59.2 per cent during October, 1916.

MISCELLANEOUS POULTRY

The total stocks of MISCELLANEOUS POULTRY reported by 222 storages on November 1, 1917, amounted to 32,568,827 pounds, while the total stocks reported by 214 storages on October 1, 1917, amounted to 33,499,969 pounds. The reports of 154 storages show stocks of 26,306,849 pounds on November 1, 1917, as compared with 24,493,832 pounds on November 1, 1916, an increase of 7.4 per cent. The reports of 190 storages show that the stocks decreased 2.4 per cent during October, 1917, while the reports of 127 storages show stocks increased 56.9 per cent during October, 1916.

All poultry holdings not segregated into broilers, roasters, fowls and turkeys have been placed in the miscellaneous group.

REPORT OF STOCKS OF FROZEN & CURED MEATS, NOVEMBER 1, 1917.

FROZEN BEEF.

The total stocks of FROZEN BEEF reported by 326 storages on November 1, 1917, amounted to 212,345,570 pounds, while the total stocks reported by 306 storages on October 1, 1917, amounted to 139,897,856 pounds. The reports of 241 storages show stocks of 179,800,846 pounds on November 1, 1917, as compared with 92,815,004 pounds on November 1, 1916, an increase of 93.7 per cent. The reports of 270 storages show that the stocks increased 49.4 per cent during October, 1917, while the reports of 189 storages show stocks increased 43.3 per cent during October, 1916.

CURED BEEF.

The total stocks CURED BEEF reported by 345 storages on November 1, 1917 amounted to 34,630,517 pounds, while the total stocks reported by 343 storages on October 1, 1917, amounted to 33,033,859 pounds. The reports of 294 storages show stocks of 32,095,325 pounds on November 1, 1917, as compared with 30,012,969 pounds on November 1, 1916, an increase of 6.9 per cent. The reports of 308 storages show that the stocks increased 5.1 per cent during October, 1917, while the reports of 252 storages show stocks increased 46.7 per cent during October, 1916.

LAMB & MUTTON.

The total stocks of LAMB & MUTTON reported by 170 storages on November 1, 1917, amounted to 4,664,073 pounds, while the total stocks reported by 170 storages on October 1, 1917, amounted to 3,366,991 pounds. The report of 129 storages show stocks of 3,472,759 pounds on November 1, 1917, as compared with 3,464,725 pounds on November 1, 1916, an increase of 0.2 per cent. The reports of 153 storages show that the stocks increased 39.0 per cent during October, 1917, while the reports of 105 storages show stocks increased 33.1 per cent during October, 1916.

FROZEN PORK.

The total stocks of FROZEN PORK reported by 286 storages on November 1, 1917, amounted to 29,258,889 pounds, while the total stocks reported by 290 storages on October 1, 1917, amounted to 45,879,197 pounds. The reports of 212 storages show stocks of 24,985,495 pounds on November 1, 1917, as compared with 23,988,129 pounds on November 1, 1916, an increase of 4.2 per cent. The reports of 249 storages show that the stocks decreased 35.1 per cent during October, 1917, while the reports of 171 storages show stocks decreased 36.8 per cent during October, 1916.

DRY SALT PORK.

The total stocks of DRY SALT PORK reported by 407 storages on November 1, 1917, amounted to 114,869,215 pounds, while the total stocks reported by 424 storages on October 1, 1917, amounted to 147,238,170 pounds. The reports of 345 storages show stocks of 108,724,051 pounds on November 1, 1917, as compared with 118,957,565 pounds on November 1, 1916, a decrease of 8.6 per cent. The reports of 369 storages show that the stocks decreased 21.5 per cent during October, 1917, while the reports of 286 storages show stocks decreased 14.5 per cent during October, 1916.

SWEET PICKLED PORK.

The total stocks of SWEET PICKLED PORK reported by 510 storages on November 1, 1917, amounted to 197,348,696 pounds, while the total stocks reported by 523 storages on October 1, 1917, amounted to 255,030,485 pounds. The reports of 423 storages show stocks of 183,195,109 pounds on November 1, 1917, as compared with 209,060,582 pounds on November 1, 1916, a decrease of 12.4 per cent. The reports of 480 storages show that the stocks decreased 22.3 per cent during October, 1917, while the reports of 376 storages show stocks decreased 14.4 per cent during October, 1916.

LARD.

The total stocks of LARD reported by 520 storages on November 1, 1917, amounted to 37,635,485 pounds, while the total stocks reported by 543 storages on October 1, 1917, amounted to 68,329,259 pounds. The reports of 423 storages show stocks of 35,551,609 pounds on November 1, 1917, as compared with 56,928,538 pounds on November 1, 1916, a decrease of 37.6 per cent. The reports of 477 storages show that the stocks decreased 45.4 per cent during October, 1917, while the reports of 364 storages show stocks decreased 20.2 per cent during October, 1916.
