REPORT OF COLD STORAGE HOLDINGS OF CREAMERY BUTTER, JULY 1, 1918.

Reports from 419 cold storages show that their rooms contain 49,389,491 pounds of CREAMERY BUTTER while on June 1, 397 storages reported 13,117,864 pounds. The 386 storages that reported holdings on July 1 of this year and last show a present stock of 47,436,912 pounds as compared with 49,981,732 pounds last year, a decrease of 2,544,820 pounds or 5.1 per cent. The reports show that during June the June 1 holdings increased 270.7 per cent, while our last report showed that during May, the May 1 holdings increased 25.5 per cent. Last year the increase during June was 386.0 per cent and during May, the increase was 148.8 per cent. A summary of this report was released by wire on July 12. As a number of firms have not responded to our inquiries, this report does not include all holdings. Upon request any or all of the information contained in the cold storage reports will be telegraphed immediately upon its release. REPORT OF COLD STORAGE HOLDINGS OF PACKING STOCK BUTTER, JULY 1, 1918.

Reports from 138 cold storages show that their rooms contain 4,769,409 pounds of PACKING STOCK BUTTER while on June 1, 137 storages reported 3,288,875 pounds. The 104 storages that reported holdings on July 1 of this year and last show a present stock of 3,343,680 pounds as compared with 1,161,399 pounds last year, an increase of 2,182,281 pounds or 187.9 per cent. The reports show that during June the June 1 holdings increased 43.7 per cent, while our last report showed that during May the May 1 holdings increased 53.1 per cent. Last year the increase during June was 412.5 per cent, and in May the increase was 92.8 per cent. A summary of this report was released by wire on July 12. As a number of firms have not responded to our inquiries, this report does not include all holdings. Upon request any or all of the information contained in the cold storage reports will be telegraphed immediately upon its release. These reports are free, except for the telegrams, which are sent charges collect.

REPORT OF COLD STORAGE HOLDINGS OF AMERICAN CHEESE, JULY 1, 1918.

Reports from 493 cold storages show that their rooms contain 32,908,952 pounds of AMERICAN CHEESE while on June 1, 496 storages reported 22,615,267 pounds. The 454 storages that reported holdings on July 1 of this year and last show a present stock of 30,839,705 pounds as compared with 34,159,210 pounds last year, a decrease of 3,319,505 pounds or 9.7 per cent. The reports show that during June the June 1 holdings increased 45.3 per cent, while our last report showed that during May the May 1 holdings decreased 6.4 per cent. Last year the increase during June was 203.9 per cent, and the increase during May was 44.5 per cent. A summary of this report was released by wire on July 12. As a few storages have not responded to our inquiries, this report does not include all holdings. 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REPORT OF COLD STORAGE HOLDINGS OF EGGS, JULY 1, 1918.

Reports from 483 cold storages show that their rooms contain 6,569,946 cases of EGGS while on June 1, 480 storages reported 5,454,891 cases. The 462 storages that reported holdings on July 1 of this year and last show a present stock of 6,501,860 cases as compared with 6,560,268 cases last year, a decrease of 58,408 cases or 0.9 per cent. The reports show that during June the June 1 holdings increased 19.2 per cent, while our last report showed that during May the May 1 holdings increased 86.2 per cent. Last year the increase during June was 33.0 per cent, and during May the increase was 131.5 per cent. A summary of this report was released by wire on July 12. As a few storages have not responded to our inquiries, this report does not include all holdings. 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REPORT OF COLD STORAGE HOLDINGS OF FROZEN EGGS, JULY 1, 1918.

Reports from 200 cold storages show that their rooms contain 13,021,789 pounds of FROZEN EGGS while on June 1, 202 storages reported 11,543,492 pounds. The 176 storages that reported for July 1 of this year and last show a present stock of 12,054,533 pounds as compared with 13,397,699 pounds last year, a decrease of 1,343,166 pounds or 10.0 per cent. The reports show that during June, the June 1 holdings increased 12.7 per cent, while our last report showed that during May, the May 1 holdings increased 22.0 per cent. Last year the increase during June, was 75.7 per cent, and the increase during May was 126.5 per cent. A summary of this report was released by wire on July 12. As a few storages have not responded to our inquiries, this report does not include all holdings.
