REPORT OF COLD STORAGE HOLDINGS OF CREAMERY BUTTER, JULY 15, 1918.

Reports from 387 cold storages show that their rooms contain 67,416,554 pounds of CREAMERY BUTTER while on July 1, 425 storages reported 49,389,206 pounds. The 369 storages that reported holdings on July 15 of this year and last show a present stock of 66,421,333 pounds as compared with 67,472,154 pounds last year, a decrease of 1,050,821 pounds or 1.6 per cent. The reports show that from July 1 to 15 the July 1 holdings increased 43.8 per cent, while our last report showed that during June the June 1 holdings increased 270.7 per cent. Last year the increase from July 1 to 15 was 41.8 per cent and during June the increase was 386.0 per cent. A summary of this report was released by wire on July 24. As a number of firms have not responded to our inquiries, this report does not include all holdings. Upon request any or all of the information contained in the cold storage reports will be telegraphed immediately upon its release. These reports are free, except for the telegrams, which are sent charges collect.

REPORT OF COLD STORAGE HOLDINGS OF EGGS, JULY 15, 1918.

Reports from 459 cold storages show that their rooms contain 6,370,304 cases of EGGS while on July 1, 489 storages reported 6,573,525 cases. The 412 storages that reported holdings on July 15 of this year and last show a present stock of 5,873,442 cases as compared with 6,102,907 cases last year, a decrease of 229,465 cases or 3.8 per cent. The reports show that from July 1 to 15 the July 1 holdings decreased 1.6 per cent while our last report showed that during June the June 1 holdings increased 19.2 per cent. Last year the increase from July 1 to 15 was 2.3 per cent, and during June the increase was 33.0 per cent. A summary of this report was released by wire on July 24. As a few storages have not responded to our inquiries, this report does not include all holdings. Upon request any or all of the information contained in the cold storage reports will be telegraphed immediately upon its release. These reports are free, except for the telegrams, which are sent charges collect.
