

## REPORT OF STOCKS OF FROZEN POULTRY, FEBRUARY 1, 1918.

TOTAL POULTRY

The total stocks of FROZEN POULTRY reported by 296 storages on February 1, 1918, amounted to 67,395,424 pounds, while the total stocks reported by 279 storages on January 1, 1918, amounted to 62,108,575 pounds. The reports of 188 storages show stocks of 19,556,255 pounds on February 1, 1918, as compared with 35,601,393 pounds on February 1, 1917, a decrease of 44.8 per cent. The reports show that the stocks increased 1.1 per cent during January, 1918, while they decreased 5.7 per cent during January, 1917.

BROILERS

The total stock of BROILERS reported by 191 storages on February 1, 1918, amounted to 8,216,019 pounds, while the total stocks reported by 169 storages on January 1, 1918, amounted to 8,611,701 pounds. The reports of 113 storages show stocks of 2,323,998 pounds on February 1, 1918, as compared with 4,637,557 pounds on February 1, 1917, a decrease of 49.9 per cent. The reports of 167 storages show that the stocks decreased 10.5 per cent during January, 1918, while the reports of 90 storages show stocks decreased 6.5 per cent during January, 1917.

ROASTERS

The total stocks of ROASTERS reported by 180 storages on February 1, 1918, amounted to 17,966,659 pounds, while the total stocks reported by 168 storages on January 1, 1918, amounted to 16,416,905 pounds. The reports of 111 storages show stocks of 5,664,493 pounds on February 1, 1918, as compared with 7,581,472 pounds on February 1, 1917, a decrease of 25.3 per cent. The reports of 160 storages show that the stocks increased 2.6 per cent during January, 1918, while the reports of 88 storages show stocks decreased 11.4 per cent during January 1917.

FOWLS

The total stocks of FOWLS reported by 196 storages on February 1, 1918, amounted to 15,076,360 pounds, while the total stocks reported by 179 storages on January 1, 1918, amounted to 13,036,964 pounds. The reports of 129 storages show stocks of 4,056,796 pounds on February 1, 1918, as compared with 8,293,253 pounds on February 1, 1917, a decrease of 51.1 per cent. The reports of 167 storages show that the stocks increased 7.4 per cent during January, 1918, while the reports of 99 storages show stocks increased 10.3 per cent during January, 1917.

TURKEYS.

The total stocks of TURKEYS reported by 226 storages on February 1, 1918, amounted to 10,475,410 pounds, while the total stocks reported by 201 storages on January 1, 1918, amounted to 4,510,048 pounds. The reports of 133 storages show stocks of 2,784,921 pounds on February 1, 1918, as compared with 3,521,168 pounds on February 1, 1917, a decrease of 20.9 per cent. The reports of 190 storages show that the stocks increased 101.6 per cent during January, 1918, while the reports of 108 storages show that the stocks decreased 1.3 per cent during January 1917.

MISCELLANEOUS POULTRY

The total stocks of MISCELLANEOUS POULTRY reported by 245 storages on February 1, 1918, amounted to 15,660,976 pounds while the total stocks reported by 240 storages on January 1, 1918, amounted to 19,532,957 pounds. The reports of 152 storages show stocks of 4,836,047 pounds on February 1, 1918, as compared with 11,567,943 pounds on February 1, 1917, a decrease of 58.2 per cent. The reports of 224 storages show that the stocks decreased 21.9 per cent during January 1918 while the reports of 125 storages show that the stocks decreased 12.1 per cent during January, 1917.

All poultry holdings not segregated into broilers, roasters, fowls and turkeys have been placed in the miscellaneous group.

REPORT OF STOCKS OF FROZEN AND CURED MEATS, FEBRUARY 1, 1918.

FROZEN BEEF.

The total stocks of FROZEN BEEF reported by 376 storages on February 1, 1918, amounted to 283,671,955 pounds, while the total stocks reported by 352 storages on January 1, 1918, amounted to 305,675,029 pounds. The reports of 305 storages show stocks of 206,244,760 pounds on February 1, 1918, as compared with 190,908,760 pounds on February 1, 1917, an increase of 8.0 per cent. The reports of 346 storages show that the stocks decreased 5.1 per cent during January, 1918, while the reports of 259 storages show stocks decreased 1.9 per cent during January 1917.

CURED BEEF.

The total stocks of CURED BEEF reported by 363 storages on February 1, 1918 amounted to 37,891,674 pounds, while the total stocks reported by 341 storages on January 1, 1918, amounted to 37,634,520 pounds. The reports of 307 storages show stocks of 35,950,372 pounds on February 1, 1918, as compared with 35,890,829 pounds on February 1, 1917, an increase of 0.2 per cent. The reports of 326 storages show that the stocks decreased 1.8 per cent during January, 1918, while the reports of 265 storages show stocks decreased 10.2 per cent during January, 1917.

LAMB AND MUTTON.

The total stocks of LAMB & MUTTON reported by 204 storages on February 1, 1918, amounted to 6,317,522 pounds, while the total stocks reported by 191 storages on January 1, 1918, amounted to 7,073,157 pounds. The report of 157 storages show stocks of 5,365,317 pounds on February 1, 1918, as compared with 5,895,319 pounds on February 1, 1917, a decrease of 9.0 per cent. The reports of 185 storages show that the stocks decreased 18.7 per cent during January, 1918, while the reports of 136 storages show stocks decreased 1.8 per cent during January 1917.

FROZEN PORK.

The total stocks of FROZEN PORK reported by 343 storages on February 1, 1918, amounted to 50,310,940 pounds, while the total stocks reported by 311 storages on January 1, 1918, amounted to 58,833,332 pounds. The reports of 305 storages show stocks of 55,155,327 pounds on February 1, 1918, as compared with 56,061,889 pounds on February 1, 1917, a decrease of 16.5 per cent. The reports of 305 storages show that the stocks increased 43.7 per cent during January, 1918, while the reports of 214 storages show stocks increased 13.0 per cent during January, 1917.

DRY SALT PORK.

The total stocks of DRY SALT PORK reported by 434 storages on February 1, 1918, amounted to 330,862,776 pounds, while the total stocks reported by 392 storages on January 1, 1918, amounted to 243,470,758 pounds. The reports of 379 storages show stocks of 316,763,231 pounds on February 1, 1918, as compared with 228,423,710 pounds on February 1, 1917, an increase of 38.7 per cent. The reports of 385 storages show that the stocks increased 33.4 per cent during January, 1918, while the reports of 309 storages show stocks increased 10.6 per cent during January, 1917.

SWEET PICKLED PORK.

The total stocks of SWEET PICKLED PORK reported by 515 storages on February 1, 1918, amounted to 311,861,852 pounds, while the total stocks reported by 478 storages on January 1, 1918, amounted to 256,256,813 pounds. The reports of 455 storages show stocks of 298,174,603 pounds on February 1, 1918, as compared with 348,269,159 pounds on February 1, 1917, a decrease of 14.4 per cent. The reports of 473 storages show that the stocks increased 19.9 per cent during January, 1918, while the reports of 393 storages show stocks increased 12.0 per cent during January 1917.

LARD.

The total stocks of LARD reported by 525 storages on February 1, 1918, amounted to 57,540,222 pounds, while the total stocks reported by 483 storages on January 1, 1918, amounted to 51,257,040 pounds. The reports of 445 storages show stocks of 56,227,827 pounds on February 1, 1918, as compared with 86,207,792 pounds on February 1, 1917, a decrease of 34.8 per cent. The reports of 484 storages show that the stocks increased 9.7 per cent during January, 1918, while the reports of 384 storages show stocks increased 1.0 per cent during January, 1917.
