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## MILK PRICE HIGHLIGHTS

Class I prices: The early October prices paid by dealers for milk used for fluid purposes (Class I) averaged \$7.14 per hundred-weight for about 150 markets, according to the Crop Reporting Board. This average was 3 cents above September and 16 cents above a year earlier. Gains from last month ranged from 6 cents in the New England and Mountain Regions to no change in the East North Central and East South Central Regions.

Store milk prices: Store prices to consumers in 25 major cities in early October averaged 57.9 cents per half gallon for the most common grade of whole milk. The price was unchanged from September and about 0.1 cent below a year earlier.

Home-delivered prices: Prices for home-delivered milk averaged 67.5 cents per half gallon in October for 25 major cities, 0.1 cent above September and 2.3 cents above October 1970. The home-delivered prices represent list prices before deductions for quantity and other discounts.

SALES OF FLUID DAIRY PRODUCTS AND RECEIPTS OF MILK  
FROM PRODUCERS

Preliminary August sales: Preliminary data on total sales of fluid dairy products during August 1971 in 63 marketing areas (58 Federal and 5 State) averaged 1 percent above a year earlier.

July sales: Revised total sales of fluid products for July in the 63 regulated markets averaged 2 percent above a year earlier.

Whole milk sales during July were down nearly 1 percent from July 1970.

Low-fat and skim milk sales in July were up 13 percent from a year earlier and cumulative sales this year were up 10 percent from last year.

Milk and cream mixtures sales (mostly half and half) averaged nearly  $4\frac{1}{2}$  percent below July 1970 but total cream sales (sweet and sour) were 6 percent above a year earlier.

Milk receipts: August receipts of milk from producers at regulated plants in 64 marketing areas (60 Federal and 4 State) were up 4 percent from a year earlier. The number of producers delivering milk to plants for these same markets was down 1 percent from August 1970.

Milk production: United States milk production in September was estimated at 9,377 million pounds, 1.1 percent more than a year earlier. September output provided 1.50 pounds of milk per person daily for all uses, equal to last year's supply but less than the 1.53 pounds for August. Production during the first 9 months of 1971 was 0.9 percent more than a year earlier.
