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MILK PRICE HIGHLIGHTS

Class I prices: Early September prices paid by dealers for milk used for fluid purposes (Class I) averaged \$7.26 per hundred-weight for about 150 markets, according to the Crop Reporting Board. This was 4 cents above August, and 15 cents above a year earlier. All regions except the West South Central showed gains over a year earlier, with increases ranging from 4 cents in the Pacific region to 24 cents in New England. The West South Central region was down 7 cents from a year earlier.

Store milk prices: Store prices to consumers in 25 major cities in early September averaged 58.1 cents per half gallon for the most common grade of whole milk. This was down 0.3 cent from August but 0.2 cent above September 1971.

Home-delivered prices: Home-delivered milk averaged 68.4 cents per half gallon in September for 25 major cities. This was down 0.1 cent from August, but 1.0 cents above September a year earlier. Home-delivered prices represent list prices before deduction for quantity and other discounts.

SALES OF FLUID DAIRY PRODUCTS AND RECEIPTS
OF MILK FROM PRODUCERS

Preliminary July sales: Preliminary July data on sales of fluid dairy products in 63 marketing areas (58 Federal and 5 State) was about the same as a year earlier.

June sales: Revised June sales of fluid products in the 63 regulated markets averaged 5 percent above a year earlier.

Whole milk sales during June were up 3 percent from the 2.3 billion pounds in June 1971.

Low-fat and skim milk sales for June 1972 were up 13 percent from the year-earlier total of 750 million pounds.

Milk and cream mixture sales (mostly half and half) were 2 percent above the 33 million pounds sold in June 1971.

Sweet and sour cream sales in June were 3 percent above a year earlier when 22 million pounds were sold.

Milk receipts: July receipts of milk from producers at plants regulated for 65 markets (61 Federal and 4 State) were up 1 percent from a year earlier. The number of producers delivering milk to plants for the same markets was down 4 percent from July 1971.

Milk production: U.S. milk production in August was estimated at 10,065 million pounds, 2 percent more than a year earlier. August output provided 1.55 pounds of milk per person daily for all uses compared with 1.62 in July but was the same as a year earlier.
