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MILK PRICE HIGHLIGHTS

Class I prices: Early January prices paid by dealers for milk used for fluid purposes (Class I) averaged \$7.49 per hundredweight for about 150 markets, according to the Crop Reporting Board. This was 10 cents above December 1972 and 30 cents above a year earlier. Regional gains from a year earlier ranged from 40 cents in the South Atlantic Region to 7 cents in the Pacific Region.

Store milk prices: Store prices to consumers in 25 major cities in early January averaged 59.5 cents per half gallon for the most common grade of milk, 0.6 cent above December and 2.1 cents above a year earlier.

Home-delivered prices: Early January prices for home-delivered milk averaged 70.0 cents per half gallon for 25 major cities. This was 1.0 cent above last month and 2.3 cents above January 1972. Home-delivered prices represent list prices before deductions for quantity and other discounts.

SALES OF FLUID DAIRY PRODUCTS AND RECEIPTS
OF MILK FROM PRODUCERS

Preliminary November sales: Preliminary data on total sales of fluid dairy products during November in 61 marketing areas averaged nearly 1 percent above a year earlier.

October sales: Revised total sales of fluid products for October in 61 regulated markets averaged 2 percent above a year earlier.

Whole milk sales in October were about the same as a year earlier.

Low-fat and skim milk sales during October gained nearly 8 percent over a year earlier. Cumulative sales in 1972 continued 11 percent above 1971.

Milk and cream mixture sales (mostly half and half) averaged about the same as October 1971 while total cream sales were up 1 percent.

Milk receipts: November receipts of milk from producers at plants regulated for 63 marketing areas (61 Federal and 2 State) were down 2.0 percent from a year earlier. The number of producers delivering milk to plants for these same markets was down 2.5 percent from November 1971.

Milk production: United States milk production in December was estimated at 9,406 million pounds, 0.2 percent less than a year earlier. December output provided 1.45 pounds of milk per person for all uses, below the 1.46 pounds a year earlier but slightly more than the November supply of 1.43 pounds.
